2023 ANNUAL REPORT

DEAR FRIENDS,

Thank you for being a part of the Western Native Trout Initiative (WNTI). In 2023 WNTI and our partners funded five native fish habitat restoration projects including \$269,056 in National Fish Habitat Partnership funds. These projects address a variety of individual challenges facing native fish in four western states, including the restoration and connection of over 83 miles of streams and rivers.

In Alaska's Copper River Basin, removing a fish barrier will open 3.2 miles of river access and 12 acres of lake access for Coastal Cutthroat Trout and a new barrier will encourage easy fish access into this new system. Removing non-native Brook Trout from Silver Creek in California's Upper Walker Basin will restore over 11 miles of stream for Lahontan Trout, a historic native fish to the area and a Federally listed species. A WNTI grant will benefit Colorado Cutthroat Trout in Clear Fork of Muddy Creek near Gunnison, Colorado. including the installation of a fish barrier to protect 11 miles of river from invasive trout species.

In addition, three projects will benefit Yellowstone Cutthroat Trout (YCT). In Idaho, removal of a fish barrier and the installation of a new irrigation system in the Snake River's Canyon Creek drainage will conserve water and restore over 11 miles of fish habitat. On Wyoming's Hoback River a habitat improvement project will improve three miles of YCT habitat. Lastly, restoration work on Flat Creek, near Jackson Hole, will modify a diversion and restore the channel to improve YCT habitat.

WNTI's 2023 Small Grants program awarded a grant for interpretative signage in the Road Beaver Creek drainage for Colorado River Cutthroat Trout restoration. This award supported design and construction of a sign overlooking Road Beaver Creek to increase public awareness of the interagency restoration project benefitting local native cutthroat trout and to educate land users about the natural life history of Colorado River Cutthroat Trout. Since its inception in 2011, the Small Grants program has granted over \$177,000 for outreach and education projects.

In 2019, WNTI launched the Western Native Trout Challenge which invites anglers to celebrate our western native trout legacy by catching these fish in their native ranges in each of the 12 western states. This program was launched in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service, BLM, and Trout Unlimited. To date, almost 1,500 anglers have registered for the program and this past year the 200th person completed the Challenge.

Again, thank you for your support of western native trout in 2023. The past year's accomplishments could not happen without your strong commitment and partnership to protect and enhance native trout.

New Fishmaps for Western Native Trout Challenge







WILDLIFE FOREVER STATE-FISH ART CONTEST

The Wildlife Forever State-Fish Art Contest partnered with WNTI again in 2023 to highlight the diversity of native trout in the western United States. This partnership connects youth to the assortment of native trout utilizing the Art of Conservation®. In honor of this collaboration, the Fish Art Contest created a new Western Native Trout Award. The WESTERN NATIVE TROUT INITIATIVE is a public-private Fish Habitat Partnership that works collaboratively across 12 western states to conserve (protect, restore and recover) 21 native trout and char species.

TO ACHIEVE THIS MISSION, WNTI WORKS TOGETHER WITH ITS ON-THE-GROUND PARTNERS TO: Establish Joint Priorities for Native Trout Conservation

Covering over 1.75 million square miles of public and privately managed lands, WNTI and our partners combine science-based assessments along with expert and local knowledge to establish joint priorities for native trout conservation at a landscape scale.

Coordinate Investment and Collaborative Action

WNTI provides a forum for partners to coordinate and invest their collective assets and capacity toward completing the highest-priority, native trout conservation efforts across the West. Proposed and led by local communities and resource agencies, these projects are funded and supported through WNTI's grant programs and in-kind contributions by our partners.

Education, Outreach and Stewardship

WNTI seeks to support and sustain the ongoing efforts of our on-the-ground partners by raising awareness for the importance of healthy native trout watersheds and facilitating greater public support for native trout conservation within local communities. Through our **Campaign for Western Native Trout**, WNTI helps encourage private investment and involvement in native trout projects and regional native trout conservation initiatives.
